THE DAVIDSON FAMILY.

JOHN DAVIDSON (The First).

The first Davidson that we have any record of in America is JOHN DAVIDSON (The First), one of the signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence; and he is the one from whom we of the "Duck River Clan" descend. His wife was a Mrs. Morrison, who married her first husband in Ireland, against the wishes of her family, and afterwards came to America. Morrison died, leaving her poor, with an infant son. In the course of time she met John Davidson (The First), to whom she was married. This John and a brother, George, came from Pennsylvania to Iredell County, N. C., about 1748, and resided near Center Church. They were Scotch-Irish. John was the father of five sons-William, George, Samuel, Thomas, and "One-eyed" John. There were also three daughters-Rachel, Peggy, and Betty. As before stated. John Davidson was one of the signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, and was a Major in a North Carolina regiment commanded by Col. Adam Alexander, in which he rendered faithful service to his country in freeing it from British rule. He certainly was a brave, fearless, and independent patriot, and a leading citizen; and we have just cause to boast of the fact that we descend from patriots that aided in establishing the best Government ever known. A monument has been erected at Charlotte, N. C., upon which his name, with those of the other signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration, appears.

MAJ. WILLIAM DAVIDSON.

The next in line is MAJ. WILLIAM DAVIDSON, eldest son of John Davidson (The First). His wife was Margaret McConnell. By this union there were nine children—John, Hugh, George, William Mitchell, Samuel, Mary, Betsy, Sallie, and Ruth. William Davidson, like his father, was a patriot in every sense of the word, and was by appointment of the Provincial Congress, April 22, 1776, a Major in the Fourth North Carolina Regiment. He was a member of the Continental Congress from North Carolina from 1818 to 1821, and was also the first Senator in the Legislature of North Carolina from the county of Buncombe. The county of Buncombe was organized at his home, and the first County Court was held there. From an old record we get the following:

" B."

"North Carolina, Buncombe County, April 16th, A.D. 1792.—Agreeable to a commission to us directed, the County Court of said county was begun, opened, and held at the house of Col. William Davidson, Esq. Present: James Davidson, David Vance, William Whitson, William Davidson, James Alexander, James Brittain, Philip Hoodenpile."

He was also a member of the Committee of Safety for Rowan County. At a meeting of this committee held on Wednesday, November 8, 1775, we find the following resolution:

"Resolved, That John Brevard, John Dickey, Moses Winsley, and Hugh Brevard, or any three of them, attend at Capt. William Davidson's, on the 20th instant, to see that the company of minute men, whom he has enlisted, are embodied, and able, effective men, and make report to the next committee."

An old family record shows that William Davidson died May 16, 1814, aged 78 years. His wife, Margaret (McCon-

nell) Davidson, died November 13, 1806, aged 58 years; yet the monument erected by the D. A. R.'s gives the year of his death as 1810. The following is a copy of what appears on his monument:

" MAJ. WM. DAVIDSON. 1744-1810.

Soldier of the Revolution. House of Commons, 1790. Senate, 1792.

One of the earliest settlers of the French Broad Valley. He was prominent in the organization of Buncombe County."

On the reverse side:

" Erected by the D. A. R."

From a paper written by Robert B. Davidson after a visit to Asheville, N. C., in 1870, we copy the following:

"Our grand uncle, Samuel Davidson, was killed by the Indians about the year 1776. He had worked his horse all day, and turned him out to grass at night. Next morning he walked out to get his horse, and had not been long gone until his wife heard the sound of a rifle shot; and, taking the alarm, she snatched up her infant daughter, Ruth, and, leaving the path, she made her way across the Blue Ridge about twenty miles to a fort on its eastern slope. A negro woman left about the same time, and made her way back to the fort along the path. The alarm was given, and two or three of those living at or near the fort went in search of the body, and found it. The infant, Ruth, grew up and married James Wilson; and some time in the present century they settled in Williamson County, Tenn., where their descendants now live, a highly respected family. About fifteen years ago (in 1855) Mack Gudger, plowing in a field near where Samuel Davidson was killed by the Indians, found a polished stone on which is rudely cut 'D. S., 1775,' and on the opposite side 'S. D.' These letters are supposed to stand for 'Daniel Smith' and 'Samuel Davidson.' Gudger gave me the stone."

Hugh Davidson is now the possessor of this stone, which he values highly.

Samuel Davidson married Miss — Smith, and Daniel Smith (her brother) married Davidson's sister, Mary. Daniel Smith was a celebrated frontiersman and Indian fighter.

In "King's Mountain and Its Heroes" the following appears:

"A little incident, worthy of relation, occurred while the British troops were encamped at William Davidson's place. A soldier was tempted to kill a chicken and enjoy a savory meal; but he was discovered by Mrs. Davidson, who reported the theft to Ferguson. He had the culprit punished, and gave the good lady a dollar in compensation for the loss. This was certainly creditable to Ferguson's sense of justice; but it was, like an oasis in the desert, a circumstance of very unfrequent occurrence."

This Mrs. Davidson was Margaret McConnell, wife of William Davidson, our ancestor, and must have been a woman of considerable courage, as Ferguson was known as "The Great Wolf of North Carolina," who often showed his bloodthirsty temper.

On another occasion, while the British were on the lookout for "rebels," they went to the home of William Davidson; and young Morrison, her husband's half-brother, attempted to frighten her into revealing the hiding place of her husband by pointing a gun at her in a threatening manner. He failed to get any information.

By way of explanation we will say that some of the "Duck River" branch of Davidsons have been a little confused by the fact that there were two William Davidsons, which can be easily explained. We descend from William Davidson, son of John Davidson (The First). Gen. William Lee Davidson. who was killed at Cowan's Ford, February 1, 1781, while resisting the advance of the British forces, under command of Colonel Hall, was a son of George Davidson, brother of John Davidson (The First). A renegade Tory, Frederick Hager, was Colonel Hall's guide on this occasion; and it was thought by General Davidson's friends that it was Hager who killed him, as he was shot through the body by a bullet from a small-bored gun—the only one in the British command and was carried by Hager. After the war, it was entirely "too hot" for Hager in North Carolina, and he came to Tennessee and settled near Cascade Falls, in what is now Coffee County. Several years later John Davidson (The Third) and his brother, Hugh Davidson, came to the Duck River country and settled, the latter about four miles east of Normandy. Hager, learning this fact, removed again westward, going into the wilderness of Arkansas, and died near Lone Post, leaving a large family.

JOHN DAVIDSON (The Third).

The above JOHN DAVIDSON (The Third) was the oldest son of Maj. William Davidson and his wife, Margaret (McConnell) Davidson. He married his cousin, Martha, daughter of James Davidson, and came to the "Duck River country" with his brother, Hugh Davidson, about 1815, and settled near the head of Knob Creek, Bedford County, Tenn. To them were born five children—Hugh, George, Andrew, James, and Margaret. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, enlisting three times. For the first enlistment Samuel Davidson was his captain. In his second and third enlistments Daniel Smith commanded his company. Joseph McDowell was his Colonel.

Hugh Davidson,

the oldest child of John Davidson (The Third), at one time lived upon his farm on Duck River, several miles above the farm of his uncle, Hugh Davidson. He married Susan McLean. They had several children. He removed, with his family, to Arkansas many years ago, and we regret we are unable to learn anything more of them.

George Davidson,

the second son of John Davidson (The Third), was twice married. His first wife was Betsy Chilcot, who was the mother of all his children. His second wife was Mrs. Sophie Caldwell, whose maiden name was Peacock.

Martha Davidson,

the oldest daughter of George, married Maj. William Allen. They had one son, Davidson Allen, who enlisted in the Confederate Army, and served throughout that desperate war, making a fine record as a soldier. He resides at Columbus, Ga., where he is actively engaged in business.

John Davidson,

son of George, married Mary Lipscomb, daughter of Dr. Thomas Lipscomb, October 22, 1851. His wife died October 14, 1853. About a year later he removed to Austin, Texas. He was a Confederate soldier. He died about 1890.

William Davidson,

the second son of George, married Jane Caldwell. They removed to Texas many years ago, where both died.

Gen. Henry B. Davidson

was the third son of George. To most of his relatives he was known as "Bucksy." He married Miss —— Hammond, daughter of a United States surgeon. Both are dead, leaving one child, Frank Davidson, who resides in California.

Gen. Henry B. Davidson was a graduate of West Point, and was an officer in the United States Army when the War between the States came on. He tendered his resignation, and offered his services to the Confederacy. He was a bold, dashing cavalry officer, and won distinction by his reckless disregard of danger.

Caroline Davidson

was the youngest child of George. She married Col. James L. Scudder, a leading lawyer at the Shelbyville bar. He was a Mexican War veteran.

Louise Scudder,

their oldest daughter, married Bascomb Myrick, of Americus, Ga., who died several years since, leaving her an only son, Shelby Myrick, now residing at Savannah, Ga., where he is a prominent citizen and leading lawyer. Mrs. Myrick is the editor and publisher of the Americus Times Recorder, one of the best papers in Georgia.

Philip J. Scudder,

their oldest son, married Abbie Wardlaw, daughter of Dr. T. D. Wardlaw, a Presbyterian minister. Their first child, Louise, died quite young. Their second child, Philip J. Scudder, Jr., is a bright lad, winning honors in his school at Franklin, Tenn.

Alberta Scudder,

the youngest daughter, married William C. Lane, a leading young business man of Shelbyville. No children.

James B. Scudder,

their second son, married Margaret Henry, and is in business in Chicago.

Three of their children—Jennie D., Carrie, and George—died single.

Andrew Davidson

was the third son of John Davidson (The Third). Died single.

James Davidson

was the fourth son of John Davidson (The Third). He married Harriet C. Hord. To them was born one child, Mary Catherine

Mary Catherine Davidson

married Col. Lewis Tillman. To them were born the following children:

Col. James D. Tillman.

He was a Confederate soldier, and commanded the Forty-first Tennessee Regiment. He is a lawyer by profession, but resides upon a fine farm near Fayetteville, Tenn.

Lewis Tillman, Jr.,

is a lawyer, with his residence at Knoxville, Tenn.

Col. S. E. Tillman,

United States Army, now a professor at West Point.

George N. Tillman

is a lawyer, and resides in Nashville, Tenn., where he takes a leading position in his profession, politically, and in his church.

Lieut. Edwin H. Tillman

is a commander in the United States Navy.

Abram M. Tillman

is United States attorney for the Middle District of Tennessee, and resides at Nashville, Tenn.

Harriet Almeda Tillman

married Capt. W. H. Brannan. She is now a widow, residing at Winchester, Tenn.

There were two sons, John and John Marshall Tillman, that died early in life; also a daughter, Mary Catherine Tillman.

All the members of this family have been remarkably successful in their chosen professions, occupying positions of honor and trust.

Margaret Davidson

was the youngest child of John Davidson (The Third). She married Frank Smart in 1822. He died in 1843. She then married David Vance McLean in 1844. McLean died in 1870. She then married Ransom Gwyn, of Viola, Tenn. "Uncle Gwyn" died in 1872, and she died in 1878. She had four children by Frank Smart—viz.: Caroline I., who married George Newton Whitson in 1844. Margaret married John Moore, lived a short time, and died without issue. Elizabeth married Robert B. McLean, brother of D. V. McLean. She lived a short while, and died without issue. William Davidson, the only son, lived near McMinnville, Tenn. He married Josephine Savage, sister of Col. John H. Savage. They had four children—Frank, Kate, William, and Boaz Savage.

Mrs. Caroline I. (Callie) Whitson left seven children—viz.: William Vance Whitson, lawyer, of McMinnville, Tenn.; Mrs. Elizabeth Gammon, who died without issue in 1870; Frank Smart Whitson; Mary Priscilla, who married R. T. Brown, of Union City, Tenn.; George D. P. Whitson, of Yorkville, Tenn.; Mrs. Josie Wiley, of Halls, Tenn.; and Mrs. Belle Curtis.

William D. Smart left five children—Frank G. Smart, Mc-Minnville, Tenn.; Kate Smart married — , and died without issue; Boaz Savage Smart died when a young man; William D. Smart, Ir., unmarried, lives in the South; and

Josephine, who married James D. Elkins and lives in McMinnville, Tenn.

George Newton Whitson, the father of William V. Whitson, of McMinnville, died in Gibson County, Tenn., July 1, 1905. He was first cousin of the children of Hugh Davidson and Jane Vance, his mother being a sister of Jane Vance.

HUGH DAVIDSON

was the second son of Mai, William Davidson and Margaret (McConnell) Davidson. He was born January 5, 1768: died September 19, 1841; married Jane Vance, August 24, 1796. He came to Tennessee about 1815 and settled on Duck River, two miles east of Normandy, in what was then Coffee County. He owned a large body of rich river land and a number of negroes. These lands were cultivated, and produced bountiful crops of corn, cotton, flax, and hemp. He also owned and operated what was in that day and time a large cotton gin, and perhaps conducted a little store. We guess at the latter statement, as we have a letter written by him, dated at "Davidsonville," to his two sons, H. L. and Robert B. Davidson, while soldiers in the Seminole Indian War. In this letter he instructs them what is the first duty of a soldier—to obey their officers. He also cautions them against the evils and sins that tempt a soldier, and closes his letter by warning them "to be careful of their horses, or they might have to walk home."

By the marriage of HUGH DAVIDSON and Jane Vance the children of two Revolutionary soldiers were united; and hence we descend on two lines from men who faced peril, hardships, privation, and death by fighting for what they thought was right, and aided in establishing this Government.

The children of this union were twelve in number, as follows: William Mitchell, Priscilla, Margaret M., David Vance, Angelina, John, Sarah Eliza, Samuel Leander, Hugh Lawson, Robert Brank, Eliza Jane, and Martha Ann.

(The son John afterwards added the "Q." to his name to distinguish himself from his uncle, John (The Third), and being an admirer of John Quincy Adams.)

HUGH DAVIDSON was a Presbyterian, and would on "preaching day" go with his entire family to the place of worship, which was for many years ten miles from his home. His entire family were members of the church. One of your committee has often listened to his father relate how they used to attend Sunday school in an old rope factory near where Bethsalem Church now stands. All denominations would assemble, and frequently there would be as many as three hundred present—almost like an old-time camp meeting. The Bible and Concordance were all the lesson helps in those days.

His wife, Jane Vance, was a daughter of Capt. David Vance, one of the heroes of "King's Mountain." She was of small stature, but certainly was a woman of much will and energy. The loom and spinning wheel were necessary articles in every thrifty farmer's home, and she was a graduate in their use. In the piecing of quilts she kept busy in her latter days, as many of her grandchildren can testify, who have samples of her skill. Her mother was Priscilla Brank. We copy from "King's Mountain and Its Heroes" an extract in regard to her father:

"David Vance, of Scotch-Irish descent, was born in Frederick County, Va., about 1748; early removed to Burke County, N. C., where he taught school, and became surveyor, serving at Ramsour's, Musgrove's Mill, and King's Mountain. He was a member of the House of Commons in 1786 and 1791; then removed to Buncombe County, N. C.; and in 1797 was one of the commissioners for running the boundary line between North Carolina and Tennessee, and became a Colonel in the militia. He died about 1820. Hon. Z. B. and R. B. Vance, of North Carolina, were his grandsons."

The home of her father, David Vance, was on Reems' Creek, about nine miles north of Asheville, and is one of the best farms in Buncombe County. The place of his burial is upon an elevated knoll, and was selected by him "as a beautiful place from which to arise in the day of the resurrection." We understand that a monument has been erected by the D. A. R. over his grave. She was born November 30, 1777; died January 12, 1858, and was buried beside her husband at Union Ridge, about five miles east of Wartrace. Their graves are marked.

George Davidson, a brother of Hugh Davidson, married Sallie McWhirter, and resided for many years in Franklin County, Tenn., and afterwards removed to Mississippi.

William Mitchell Davidson, another brother, married Elizabeth (Betsy) Vance. They resided for many years on Jonathan's Creek, Haywood County, N. C., where all their children were born. About 1844 they moved to South Carolina, where William Mitchell died. His widow and family returned to North Carolina

Şamuel Davidson was married twice. His first wife was Miss — McRee, a daughter of Rev. Dr. McRee, a Presbyterian minister. His second wife was the above-mentioned "Betsy," the widow of his brother, William Mitchell. He lived and died on the old Davidson plantation, on Swannanoa, upon which his father, Maj. William Davidson, died. Both are buried on that plantation.

Mary Davidson married Daniel Smith, a celebrated frontiersman and Indian fighter. Their oldest son, James Smith, was the first white child born in North Carolina west of the Blue Ridge. They lived and died in Buncombe County, N. C.

Betsey Davidson married Thomas Alexander. They removed in an early day to Williamson County, Tenn., and both died there.

Sallie Davidson married Joshua Williams. They removed to Maury County, Tenn., and resided there until their deaths.



Ruth Davidson married Gen. Samuel Williams. They removed to and died in Maury County, Tenn.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that Hugh Davidson married Jane Vance, and his brother, William Mitchell Davidson, married her sister, Elizabeth (Betsy) Vance; hence the children of these two families were double first cousins, and a most kindly feeling has ever existed between them. The Asheville branch of the Davidson family descend from the latter couple.

We regret to state that we know very little about the descendants of George, Betsey, Sallie, and Ruth, all of whom came to Tennessee.

WILLIAM MITCHELL DAVIDSON (The Second)

was the first child of Hugh Davidson and Jane (Vance) Davidson. He was born August 21, 1797; died March 6, 1877. He married Mary M. Caruthers, of Maury County, Tenn., July 6, 1837. She died March 14, 1883. Only one child was born to this couple, Mary, who died in her early teens. All three are buried at Columbia, Tenn., which place had been his home for many years, where he was a merchant and occupied many positions of trust.

PRISCILLA DAVIDSON,

the oldest daughter of Hugh Davidson and Jane (Vance) Davidson, was born July 6, 1799; married William A. Brittain, January 2, 1821; died August 29, 1840. To them were born—

Robert Newton Brittain, born October 9, 1821; married Lizzie Hamilton at Chickamauga, Ga., ————; died in Arkansas, October 5, 1876. To them were born the following

children: Jane Priscilla, William Taylor, James Mitchell, Marcus Lafayette, Ann Elizabeth, Martha L., Rachel Abigail, George W., Mary Angelina, and John Leroy. Many years ago he removed to Texas, but later to Arkansas, where he died. His children and grandchildren are scattered over the Western States.

Mitchell Davidson Brittain was born December 29, 1822; married Nancy B. Lane, December 15, 1857; died September 26, 1883, at his home near Normandy, Tenn., where his widow still resides. No children.

Martha Jane Brittain, born July 27, 1824; died August 26, 1824.

Leander Vance Brittain, born September 20, 1825; died in July or August, 1847.

William Gaston Brittain, born April 9, 1827; married Mary Ann Long, of Lewisburg, Tenn., February 13, 1855; died at his home, McMinnville, Tenn., July 17, 1904. To them were born four children—Caddie Jane, Samuel Davidson, Mary Priscilla, and Nannie Emily. He was a member of the First Tennessee Regiment in the Mexican War.

Caddie Jane Brittain, born October 9, 1855; married Epps Roberts at the home of her parents, in McMinnville, Tenn., June 19, 1878. To them were born the following children: Hubert Gaston, Oscar Lynne, Leila Lewis, Samuel Allen, Nannie Elizabeth, and Mary Priscilla. All reside at home, near Lewisburg, Tenn., except Hubert, who resides at Ponca, Okla. Leila, the eldest daughter, has been engaged in teaching at Adrian, Ga.

Samuel Davidson Brittain, born September 7, 1857; married Mollie Black, May 29, 1905. Resides in McMinnville, Tenn. No children. Travels for a large Eastern firm.

Mary Priscilla Brittain, born March 15, 1859; married James W. Snodgrass, June 15, 1882. She is now a widow, and resides in Nashville. To them were born three children—James Murray, Fannie Elnora, and George Lewis. The daughter,

Fannie Elnora Snodgrass, married Walter Ferguson in Nashville, Tenn., October 9, 1905.

Nannie Emily Brittain, born August 31, 1861. She is a musician of rare talent. Resides with her sister (Mrs. Snodgrass) in Nashville, Tenn.

Margaret Angelina Brittain, born September 29, 1829; died June 29, 1837.

Milton Marvey Brittain, born November 11, 1831; died July 15, 1840.

Martha Ann Brittain, born September 13, 1833; died July 15, 1837.

Emily Rachel Brittain, born February 19, 1836; married Daniel Martin Shofner in Coffee County, Tenn., December 15, 1853. She is now a widow, and resides in Nashville, Tenn. To them were born the following children: William Watterson, October 16, 1854; Mitchell Brittain, August 28, 1856; Henry Gaston, October 3, 1858; Fannie Martin, August 17, 1860, and died November 7, 1861; Samuel Davidson, January 20, 1862; Robert Edwin, July 17, 1870, and died October 16, 1884; Martha Amelia, February 8, 1875.

Martha Amelia Shofner married John William Wirsching, October 17, 1901. They reside in Nashville, Tenn. All the Shofner brothers are actively engaged in business in that city.

William Watterson Shofner married Frances Ellen McGuire, May —, 1883. To them were born the following children: Daniel Martin Shofner, Jr., born February 23, 1885; married Katie McLaflin, May —, 1906. Lewis Dean Shofner, born September 17, 1886; married Maud McGuire, February —, 1906. William Emmett Shofner, born September 19, 1888. Hugh McGuire Shofner, born February 17, 1891. Frederick Martin Shofner, born September —, 1893. Aloysius Wilson Shofner, born March —, 1896. Mary F. Shofner, born November —, 1897; died May —, 1899. Joseph Edwin Shofner, born May —, 1900. Louise Thelma Shofner, born July 3, 1903.

Hugh Lawson Brittain, born November 28, 1837; died August 1, 1854.

MARGARET M. DAVIDSON.

the second daughter of Hugh Davidson and Jane (Vance) Davidson, was born October 18, 1801; married Ransom Gwyn, November 1, 1832; died April 21, 1868. "Uncle Gwyn," as he was known to the older ones now living, died February 8, 1872. To them were born two sons and two daughters—Martha Jane, Romulus, Remus, and Julia.

Martha Jane Gwyn, born December 10, 1834; married David H. Wooton, December 6, 1853; died June 19, 1894. David H. Wooton died May 5, 1900. Both were members of the Christian Church. To them were born three children—Myrtle Elizabeth, Ransom Gwyn, and Annie Amelia.

Myrtle Elizabeth Wooton, born December 15, 1854; died July 10, 1863.

Ransom Gwyn Wooton, born May 25, 1856; married Lillie Viola Witherspoon, November 12, 1885. To them were born four children—David Roy, born October 2, 1886; Annie Euphena, born January 25, 1888; Jessie Evelina, born December 23, 1889; Hudie Jane, born March 31, 1894. All reside at Viola, Tenn.

Annie Amelia Wooton, born January 23, 1859; died September 6, 1861.

Maggie Merrit Mabry married S. W. Taliaferro. They have seven children—Irene, Julia, Fannie, Rose, Edwin, Anna, and Charles. Reside at McMinnville, Tenn.

Mary John Mabry married Capt. J. H. Smith. No children. Reside at Manchester, Tenn.

William R. Mabry married Atta McMillian. They have two children, Edith and Susan. Reside at Birmingham, Ala. Ransom N. Mabry. Single. Resides at Birmingham, Ala. Martha M. Mabry married A. G. Brown. Died, leaving two

children, Julia and Henry. Their second child, Charles, died in infancy.

John D. Mabry died in childhood.

Hugh Elliott Mabry married Walter L. Smith. Died, leaving one child, Mollie.

Thomas Myrtle Mabry married S. M. Ramsey. No children. Reside at Viola, Tenn.

Robert Vance Mabry. Single. Resides at Birmingham, Ala.

Hugh Lawson Davidson was born about 1846; married Rebecca Deason in 1870; died about 1882. His wife died Christmas Eve, 1879. They had four daughters—Lizzie Guy, born in 1872; Mary Lavinia, born in 1874; Hugh Lawson, born in 1876; and Alice Mosely, born in 1878. The oldest daughter, Lizzie Guy, married A. W. Dumas in 1890; died in 1901, leaving four children—Guy, Hugh, Gladys, and Don. The youngest daughter, Alice Mosely, married Maj. V. H. Holmes, April 23, 1907. All reside at Trenton, Tenn.

Samuel L. Davidson's third wife was Mrs. — Norton, widow of Dr. James Norton. After this marriage he resided in or near Tullahoma, Tenn., and is buried there.

HUGH LAWSON DAVIDSON

was born April 17, 1814; died at Rogersville, East Tennessee, April 30, 1889. Early in life he developed a taste for the very best literature. He was attending school at Columbia, Tenn., when the call for volunteers for the Seminole Indian War was issued, and enlisted in Captain Frierson's Company of Mounted Infantry. and served in that campaign. When his term of enlistment expired, he returned to Columbia and continued his course in school. After this he spent several years upon his father's farm. Then he read law, and soon won a prominent place at the bar.

Prior to the Civil War he was in politics a decided Whig, and was often urged to become a candidate for the Legislature; but this he steadily refused to do. In 1844, however, he was elected by the Legislature Attorney-general for the circuit composed of the counties of Bedford, Rutherford, Wilson, and Cannon, and for six years served efficiently in that position. In 1852 the Legislature elected him Circuit Judge for the circuit above mentioned by a majority of one vote over Hon. Abram Caruthers, one of the ablest lawyers in Tennessee. Serving eight years as judge, he was reëlected to that

position in 1860 by a vote of the people of the circuit, and was requalified; but the Civil War coming on about that time, Judge Davidson went South; and Andrew Johnson, Military Governor, declared the office vacant and appointed Hon. Henry Cooper to succeed him. After this Judge Davidson held no official station, except that he was often appointed special judge to try cases in which the regular judge was incompetent. He became a Democrat on the election of Mr. Lincoln to the presidency.

He was twice married. His first wife was Ede Harris Harrison, daughter of Capt. Robert P. Harrison, to whom he was married April 24, 1838. She died March 15, 1858.

Robert H. Davidson was the only child of the above couple; born July 7, 1839; died June 21, 1863. On November 27, 1860, he was married to Sarah A. Brame, who died October 6, 1903.

Robert H. Davidson, Jr., was the fruit of this union; born October 14, 1861; died October 6, 1904. Never married.

The second wife of Judge Hugh Lawson Davidson was Mrs. Elizabeth Russell Nice, to whom he was married in Colorado County, Texas, October 28, 1861. She was a native of Virginia, and is a lady of most attractive manner. She resides with her son, W. G. Nice, at Rogersville, East Tennessee.

ROBERT BRANK DAVIDSON

was the youngest son of Hugh Davidson and Jane (Vance) Davidson. He was born March 12, 1817; died at his home in Shelbyville, Tenn., October 3, 1900.

He was twice married. His first wife was Narcissa S. Harrison, daughter of Capt. Robert P. Harrison, to whom he was married August 21, 1843, and from whom he was separated by death May 8, 1867. She was the mother of his two children, Bettie Harrison Davidson and Hugh Davidson.

He was brought up on the farm of his father as boys were in that time. Between crops he attended school. When the call for volunteers for the Seminole Indian War was issued, he and his older brother, Hugh Lawson Davidson, who were then attending school at Columbia, Tenn., and assisting their eldest brother. William Mitchell Davidson, in his store, enlisted in Captain Frierson's Company of Mounted Infantry and served in the Florida War. About two years after his return from this campaign he went to Western Texas and engaged in surveying. After two or three years of this life, he returned to Tennessee. At that time Capt. Robert P. Harrison was Clerk and Master of the Chancery Court at Shelbyville, and he secured employment there as his deputy, and commenced to read law, and in the course of time received his license to practice law, in which profession he won considerable reputation as a successful chancery lawyer.

On September 27, 1850, he was appointed Consul of the United States for the port of Rio Grande, South America. After arriving at New York en route to South America, he was advised by an old sea captain not to accept the position, as his health at that time was critical. He tendered his resignation and returned to Tennessee.

Early in life he became a member of the Presbyterian Church, and was for many years a ruling elder and clerk of the session of the church at Shelbyville.

On March 16, 1871, he was married to Mrs. Virginia S. Buchanan. His widow resides at Shelbyville, Tenn.

Bettie H. Davidson, his eldest child, was born March 14, 1849; died February 14, 1889. She was of small stature, but wonderful intellect. She read the best literature, and possessed a rare faculty of memory. She was a devout Christian; a genial, kind, and affectionate person, carrying sunshine wherever she went.

Hugh Davidson, his son, was born June 18, 1852; married Mollie Hortense Thompson, January 3, 1893. Is a merchant at Shelbyville, Tenn. No children.

Eliza Jane Davidson,

born June 3, 1819; died September 18, 1822.

Martha Ann Davidson.

the last child of Hugh Davidson and Jane (Vance) Davidson, was born December 16, 1821; married Rev. William B. Watterson, December 24, 1840; died May 3, 1857. One son, William D. Watterson, was their only child. He was a Confederate soldier, and was severely wounded, but recovered. Soon after the war he was admitted to the bar at Winchester, Tenn., and also became editor of the Winchester Home Journal. He there married Miss Olivia Brazelton. He died about 1870, leaving no children. He was a cousin of Hon. Henry Watterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal.
