



# A Century With Harlan

Mrs. Nettie Minnick, Harlan's oldest resident who has lived through five major wars 25 Presidential campaigns and the birth of what she calls "streamlined living."

For those persons who aspire to live out a century. Mrs. Minnick has this bit of sound advice:

"Just behave yourselves and live temperately."

Mrs. Minnick who was 102, April 3, firmly believes that "temperance" in all things tends to lengthen life. But by temperance she doesn't mean crawling off into some corner. She advices one's being active and being a part of the community.

During her 102 years, she says she's always taken an active part and interest in Harlan, has worked hard, helped the sick, but has never stayed out late at night.

At this point in her life she admits her eyesight is poor, but her memory is good.

#### Remembers Civil War

She fully remembers the Civil War. One reason, she points out, is because her brother, too young then to enlist in the Army, had signed the papers three times before his father let him go. Her brother, she said, died of pneumonia contracted while on guard duty with the Union Army. She also remembers the death of her father in 1866 a year after the Civil War.

Mrs. Minnick is proud of the fact that she's missed very few trips to the voting polls, stating:

"It's the duty of every American citizen to vote."

Mrs. Minnick has lived in the same home since she was a bride, and was born in a dwelling only 200 feet from her present home..

#### She Likes To Travel

She reports that she has always liked to travel, having visited Florida frequently, with other trips to Colorado, Niagara Falls (three times), and Cleveland.

"Home, however, is the best place of all—right here where I have lived all my life," she commented. She adds that she attended a one-room school in her youth, and has been a widow since 1915.

When people jokingly ask her how she thinks she'll feel when she's 103, she retorts:

"Why don't you come back when I'm 103 and find out for yourself?"

The Harlan Centennial will be celebrated in the form of a pageant play, beginning with scenes from 1853 and carrying through to the present day. Instead of being in the first scene, Mrs. Minnick will appear in the last scene representing 1953.

She's thrilled at the thought of taking part in the gala festivities, but feels bad because no one has asked her to give a "reading". In the past few years she has read a good deal of poetry and has memorized many poems.

#### Mother of Seven

Mrs. Minnick is the mother of seven children four living. She has 11 grandchildren; 16 great-grandchildren; and two great-great-grandchildren.



# Centennial Motes

## Harlan's Living Past

Although admitted to the Union in 1816, Indiana was very sparsely setted at that time and had only thirteen counties lying along with the Ohio River. Less than one-fourth of the state had been ceded to the white man and more than half of its total area was still active Indian hunting ground. Settlement proceeded so rapidly, however, that new counties were organized by the legislature at every session. On December 17, 1823, legislation was enacted for the formation of a new county "to be known and designated by the name of Allen, in memory of Col. John Allen of Kentucky, a hero in the War of 1812." May 31, 1824, the first meeting of the county board of commissioners ordered that the "County of Allen be constituted as one township, and called the township of Wayne." Congress had established a land office in Fort Wayne for the sale of northern Indiana lands at \$1.25 per acre, and the rich soil attracted so many settlers that it soon became necessary to divide the county into a number of townships. Springfield Township was created in 1837 and contained what is now Scipio Township until March 6, 1843, when the county board authorized the separation of Scipio Township and scheduled its first election. By 1846 the division of Allen County had been completed and twenty townships formed.

The first settlements in the vicinity of Harlan were made in 1836 by three families — those of William Sweet, Ezra May, and Isaac Hall. They found a primitive, fertile land rich in timber, abundant in wild life, and teeming with evidence of recent Indian occupation. (Although a few bands of wandering Indians remained in the township until 1839, most of them had been removed by government treaties a few years earlier.) By 1840 a dozen families had found their way to Springfield Township; in the following decade settlers poured into the area so rapidly that it was impossible to list them. Statistics show that by 1850, the population of the township was 702; in 1860, it was 1,505; and in 1870, 1,749.

In May, 1859, Ezra May laid out "a small plat of the town which bears his name south of the Hicksville road, adjoining the plat of Haran, which had been laid out in December, 1853, between the Hicksville and Spencerville roads, by Lewis Reichelderfer." (The Valley of the Upper Maumee River by Col. Robert Robertson, 1889, p. 351) Because of the enterprise and popularity of Mr. May, both towns, growing side by side, soon became known as Maysville and continued to use that name for over a half century.

The first post office in the township was located at Cuba in 1849. Two years later a second post office was established in the eastern part of the township at Hall's Corner. In 1854 the Cuba office was moved to Harlan. The fact

that the government designated the postal address as Harlan and that there was another Maysville in southern Indiana were contributing factors in the eventual loss of the name of Maysville although Dr. Cosgrove protested as late as 1903 that to change the name of Maysville to Harlan "would undoubtedly fail to be of any permanent benefit to the town, its people, or the business men of the place."

Through this township runs a natural ridge or water-shed and it was along this ridge that the county commissioners authorized the surveying of the first township road in January, 1839. In May of the same year, it is recorded that Ezra May with nineteen others petitioned that the direction of the road be changed "between the eight mile tree and the fourteen mile tree," the latter being on the farm of Mr. May. His request was granted and the records show that in September, 1839, twelve dollars was allowed by the board for this surveying change and Ezra May was allowed three dollars and a half for carrying the chain. It is possible that this road was corduroy since many of the other county roads were so built, but there is no evidence to substantiate this surmise. Although the county board voted forty-three dolars for its upkeep in 1839 and fifty-five dollars in 1843, enterprising capitalists along the way contributed privately toward its maintenance and were privileged to build toll houses and collect tolls from the road's travelers.

All taverns and groceries which "dispense foreign and domestic" goods had to be licensed by the county commissioners. Such a license cost William Letcher, son-in-law of Ezra May, the sum of ten dollars for the year 1843.

Springfield Township's first school opened in 1840 in a double log dwelling on the property of Ezra May at the site of the Odd Fellows' Hall in Harlan. It had a puncheon floor and there were no desks. The pupils sat on benches of split slabs and each pupil's reservation was marked in chalk by the teacher, Miss Sara Bracey. A second school, a rough hewed structure, was built in 1841 on the land of William Sweet. In this building the Methodist Sunday School and Church were organized as well as the English Lutheran Sunday School. These schools were supported by tuition paid by the families of the students and assessments were made according to the number of pupils sent from each family. This subscription method continued in vogue until 1851 when the public school system was generally adopted throughout the county. In 1856 a prize of three dollars was offered for the best plan and specification for a school building and the plan submitted by Isaac Bickhart won the prize. Soon afterward contracts were let for the building of the first district schools. District School No. 1 was contracted by Sam Stewart; the

township agreed to pay him \$115.50 immediately \$115.50 when the house was completed, and \$115 on the first Monday in June 1857, making the total cost of the first district school \$346. District School No. 8 was built next at a cost of \$445. Other district schools were built later at costs ranging from \$295 to \$400. By 1880 at least ten, one source says twelve, such district schools had been erected with a total enrollment of 735.

In 1888 Dr. C. F. Swift was elected trustee of Springfield Township and succeeded in building a two-story, four-room, brick school in spite of much local opposition. It was from this building that the first high school class graduated in 1890. In 1908 the cornerstone was laid for a two-story brick building about one hundred feet south of the first building; in 1939-40 the two structures were linked together by a new building approximately ninety-five by forty eight feet and containing class rooms, study hall, and basement rooms used later for the cafeteria and band room,

Except for the appointment of the Justice of Peace (Ezra May) and two road supervisors, the township had no elections until 1844. On the first Monday in April in that year at the home of Henry Gruber the following officers were elected: three trustees, two constables, one clerk, six road supervisors, two fence viewers, two overseers of the poor, and one treasurer. These were elected for a one year term except for the fence viewers who were elected every two years. In 1849 the office of assessor was added to the election ballot. In 1856 it was decided to stagger the election of the three township trustees so that each would serve for a three year term one leaving each year. Accordingly, in that year one trustee was elected for three years, one for two years, and one for only one year. In that same year the number of road supervisors was increased from six to nine as the miles of township roads increased.

The first township funds were set up in 1854. \$206.62 was budgeted for the township's general fund, \$133.87 went to the road fund, and \$349 was allowed the schools.

#### CHURCHES

In the winter of 1843-44, the Methodists organized their first class at the school house on Section 28. The twelve members of this class continued to meet at the school until 1854 when the first church building was completed in the eastern part of the town of Maysville near the old cemetery. This was a frame structure, twenty-four by forty feet, and when its use was discontinued in 1882, it was sold to the Lutheran people who afterward sold it to private owners. This building is still in use for storage and stands north of the Corner Store on Water Street, In 1881 construction of the second house of worship was begun and the building was de-

dicated in 1882. This structure, remodeled several times, is the present home of the Harlan Methodist Church.

The first class of the Methodist Protestant Church was organized in Cuba in the winter of 1851 with fourteen members in the class. Meetings were held in the schoolhouse until 1854 when a frame building was erected at a cost of \$500. In 1886 this building was moved to Maysville and the congregation worshipped there until 1878 when a new building was erected at the corner of Water and Second Streets. In 1941 the general conference of the Methodist Church united the Methodist Protestant Church with the Methodist Episcopal Churches North and South and the two churches have continued as one group since that time,

In October, 1885, the Rev. Jabes Shaffer was called as pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Churches of the Springfield pastorate in Allen County. As Rev. Shaffer had residence in Harlan he had contact with a number of families who wished a Lutheran Church there. Accordingly, on March 28, 1886, St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church was organized with thirty charter members. For the first six months the new organization worshipped in the United Brethren Church; then a lot was purchased at the location of the present home of Alfred Applegate and the old Methodist Church building was bought and moved to it, About five years later, the United Brethren Church was offered for sale. This building was then purchased, including the lot of about one acre, and remodeled and rededicated. It remains the present home of the St. Mark's congregation.

Sometime prior to 1886 Isaac Dreisbach donated land upon which was to be built a United Brethren Church and gave \$500 toward its construction. A frame building was erected which was later sold to the Lutherans. In 1892 a handsome brick church was built. When the membership dwindled until it was no longer possible to maintain a church, this building was used by the Harlan Church of Christ for a time and after standing idle for a number of years was converted into an apartment building.

With the help of E. W. Allen, minister of the West Jefferson Church of Christ, Fort Wayne, and Grant W. Spear, minister of the First Church of Christ, Hicksville, Ohio a group of Christians in and near Harlan formed a congregation in the I.O.O.F. Hall - used recently by the Harlan Inn — in the year 1903, Deacons and elders were chosen for the spiritual leadership of the local congregation. Worship services were later held in the former United Brethren Church, now a duplex dwelling located the first house west of the Harlan Implement Store. The first house of worship was begun in 1905 and dedicated May 27, 1906. This building burned January 1, 1928, and the present structure of brick veneer was dedicated February 10, 1929.

## Harlan's Living Past (Continued)

#### INDUSTRIES

Most of the early settlers who came into Springfield Township were farmers, but the demands of even a small group soon necessitated certain industries. Estes Howe had been an apprentice shoe maker while in New York and became one of the pioneer shoemakers in Allen County, making all kinds of boots and shoes; Ira Grubb embarked in blacksmithing and wagon making; William Moore ran the first threshing machine in the township; George Nusbaum became a pumpmaker and carpenter; William Harter was a machinist; Jesse Greenawalt learned to be a cabinet maker; Henry Horn was a wagon maker; Peter Repp became a professional painter; many others worked as carpenters and blacksmiths and operated small saw mills to supplement their farm income.

In 1859 John Hawkins built a flouring mill which was later sold to Timbrook and Ashley and then to the Eckles Brothers. This was a three story building with an engine room 20x30 feet. It had three run of buhrs and a manufacturing capacity of thirty barrels of flour daily.

In 1862 Seymour Coomer and Jacob Bickhart erected in Maysville a building for the manufacture of shingles. Machinery was added later for making a saw mill. This was a two story building with a thirty-horse power engine capable of sawing 800,000 feet of lumber annually.

In 1879 Isaac Bickhart built a brick building to house the Maysville Planning Mill. Its machinery included a sixteen horse power engine, surface planer rip-saw, molding machine, band saw, shaping machines, and turning lathes. He manufactured flooring, siding, moldings, battens and dressed lumber and employed four to six mill hands regularly.

By 1915 Harlan had a remarkable number of businesses and industries. On the list were: a state bank, a newspaper, a post office, one public hall, five general stores, two hardware and implement stores, one department store, one drug store one garage, one furniture store, one meat market, one packing company, one hotel, two lunch rooms, two barber shops, one shoe shop, one feed barn, one pool room, one tin shop, one telephone exchange, one jewelry store, one millinery store, one harness shop, one cement and brick factory, four blacksmith shops three physicians and surgeons, two veterinarians, two auctioneers, one funeral director, four painters and paper hangers, one mason and plasterer, and two contracting carpenters.

#### LODGES AND CLUBS

The Harlan Masonic Lodge, No. 224, A., F. & A. M. was instituted in May, 1863, and chartered in 1864 with seven charter members. It now owns the building near the center of the town formerly occupied by the Harlan State Bank, The present membership is 120.

Prospect Lodge, No. 331, I.O.O.F. was or-

ganized under a charter dated June 22 1869. There were five charter members. Immediately after organizing, the lodge purchased a building which they repaired and remodeled. In 1889 this building was torn down and replaced with a hall for public use which had a seating capacity of 600. This hall now is used by the Springfield Township Schools for physical education classes and auditorium purposes. This group is no longer active.

Prospect Rebecca Lodge, No. 74, organized in 1889. None of its charter members are living although Mrs. Minnick, Harlan's oldest citizen, has been a member for over sixty years. This group still meets regularly.

The Order of Eastern Star Chapter was organized Feb. 28, 1906 with six charter members, one of whom, Myrtle Cook, is still living. The present membership numbers one hundred twenty-three.

The Harlan Culture Club, an affiliate of the County Federated Women's Clubs, was organized in 1912 by ten charter members as a study club. Mrs. D. D. Boston is the only living charter member. This club is one of the oldest women's clubs in Allen County.

The Country Club, a woman's farm club, was organized in January and February of 1916. There were forty-three charter members, twelve of whom are still active. This club meets the fist Tuesday of each month.

Another affiliate of the County Federated Women's Clubs is the Art and Literary Club organized in 1929 with five charter members all of whom are still active. With one exception all seventeen members of the present club are graduates of Harlan High School. It was this group that was instrumental in starting the distribution of Christmas baskets each year.

The Harlan Lions Club was first chartered in April 1938, with twenty-six members and rechartered in September, 1944, with fifty-five members. The present membership is forty-five and many of the present members have perfect attendance records. This group of civic minded citizens were responsible for the placing of street lights in Harlan; they sponsor the local Boy Scout troop; they have been very active in promoting the park project; they have marked the cisterns in the town as a fire protective measure.

The Harlan American Legion was organized in 1946. The present membership totals seventynine and includes veterans of World Wars I and II and Korean veterans. Its projects are child welfare, Boys State, yearly school awards, and the local air defense program. The legion auxiliary dates from 1947 and has fifty-five active members consisting of mothers, wives, daughters, and sisters of World War I and II veterans. This group contributes toward the support of one child each year at the Knightstown Home, sends one girl each year to Girls' State, and assists in the rehabilitation program at the Fort Wayne Veteran's Hospital.


